Resident Spotlight:

LENA LEWIS

Lee's favorite part of the day is when her good friends Alice and Carol join her for their daily card game of knock rummy and skip bo at the dining room table at Francis House. "These two ladies are what you call true friends, they stick with you, no matter what," Lee says pointing at her companions. However, sitting isn't something that Lee is used to. She has spent her whole life staying busy working, volunteering, and doing special things for those who needed help.

Lee was born on December 24, 1922 and raised in Poughkeepsie, New York. Her Italian parents both immigrated to America in their early teens. Lee was the youngest of eight and admits she was spoiled by her father, even during the hard times of the Depression. "Fanny Farmer on Main Street had a huge chocolate bunny in the window. People could buy chips of chocolate from the bunny. Dad would always bring me some home."

Lee met the love of her life, Thomas Lewis, when they were teenagers. Their relationship was interrupted when Tom enlisted in the Army to serve his country in World War II (Thomas earned a purple heart and bronze star). They lost communication for a few years. "Until one day I was getting off the bus and I heard, 'Hey Lee!' I knew who it was right away. We were married one month later." Lee and

Tom were a perfect match. They both loved life, loved to dance: the lindy, the fox trot and the polka were their favorites. Tom worked in construction and Lee managed banquets at the local 4-star hotel. They had four children: Richard, James, Gloria and Faith.

Lee says her life-changing moment happened in 1968 when she became a born-again Christian. Tom joined her as a born-again Christian in 1972. "We gave our lives to the Lord and doing His work."

After their youngest child graduated, Tom and Lee set off on a life they had always dreamed of. They bought an RV and traveled throughout the United States taking odd jobs. "We'd pull into a small town and set-up home," says Lee. "There were always jobs available. And when we wanted a change in a year or so, we packed up and moved on." They lived in

New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas and North Carolina.

In 1979, while living in North Carolina, Lee and Tom got a call from their son James that their new granddaughter was born with spina bifida. Tom and Lee came to Syracuse to support their family. They sold the RV. They moved in to Woodhaven Apartments on Syracuse's west side. Lee worked in the office and Tom worked maintenance. Lee devoted her days giving hands-on care to her granddaughter Nicole. Tom used his carpentry skills to adapt furniture and build a special stand for Nicole. They also cared for their grandchildren Devan and Spencer.

When asked what her hobbies were, Lee responded, "There was no time for hobbies. There was work, volunteering and helping at church. Lee and Tom volunteered at the VA

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

The long-awaited spring has come to Central New York. Flower bulbs and seeds planted in the fall waited dormant beneath fallen leaves and snow. But now sun and warming temperatures have produced green shoots and flowers of all colors and hues. Trees, budding and blooming, stand as nature's elegance after

the long season of bare and wind-buffeted branches. Soil has been turned and prepared to receive the seeds that will eventually produce the bountiful harvest of summer.

I recently read a quote by an unknown author, "The tiny seed knows that in order to grow, it needed to be dropped in dirt, covered with darkness and struggle to reach the light." Isn't that the way we sometimes feel? Out of the blue a diagnosis, a sudden family emergency or an unexpected loss drops us into darkness like a seed planted in the ground, not knowing what will happen next.

But unlike the tiny seed, we choose the soil where we plant and cultivate those seeds that are important to us, that give us strength and reinforce our values. A teaching in the Buddhist tradition notes, "Our life is shaped by our thoughts. We become what we think." as transporters. During the storm of 1998 they rode along with FEMA delivering meals to those most in need in Syracuse. They also loved their volunteer time at the Rescue Mission where they worked in the donation trailers, then volunteered in the mail room, and served in the kitchen. Lee shares, "When I turned 89 they promoted us to host and hostess and we would greet all the people coming in for their meal. We even had our own greeting station."

Lee says she was most happy when she was helping people. "The pastor asked for help purchasing Easter outfits for those who couldn't afford it. That's when I met Rosemary. It was so wonderful to see her happy." Lee continued to personally support Rosemary and her mother Gerry throughout their lives. Even after they passed away, Lee would visit their grave sites and bring flowers. Lee also served as a one-on-one companion for people with disabilities through Exceptional Family Resources.

Tom passed away in 2012, and Lee says her faith, family and friends helped her through it. She continued to keep busy volunteering and with activities through her church. Lee says stopping

driving at 92 didn't even slow her down because "friends were always there and we loved going out for coffee every day!"

Lee admits it has been a hard adjustment from her busy schedule to having to rest throughout the day because of her illness. After not feeling well throughout the holidays, Lee learned this past January that she had incurable cancer. Her daughter Faith says when they learned about Francis House they knew she needed to be here. "Our family's biggest concern for mom was that she felt safe. Her first night at Francis House she slept all night through. We knew we made the right decision."

Says Lee, "I don't like being alone, but I wasn't sure if I would like it here. One night I was up at midnight and I just couldn't sleep. Mary (Francis House caregiver) asked me if I wanted to go to the Chapel and I did. It was just what I needed. We sat and prayed together. It was beautiful."

Her faith continues to see her through. "I am waiting to go to that place of peace, with no pain, where the streets are of gold...where I can rest with my Lord!"

Volunteer Spotlight:

BETTY GRADY

Betty Grady began her volunteer service at Francis House after talking with her friend, Shirley Cinqmars, at a Knights of Columbus gathering. Betty had just lost her husband Dave, and although she was anxious to help, Shirley suggested she wait a year. Betty took that advice and began her volunteer service the next year in 1992. As a former hospice volunteer, helping in a home with the mission to care for people who were dying was exactly right for Betty.

Caring was part of Betty's being. From a young age Betty knew she wanted to be a nurse. She attended nursing school in her hometown of Brooklyn, earning her degree attending night school at Hunter College while working full time in Pediatrics at Brooklyn Hospital. Betty moved to Syracuse in 1953 to teach Pediatric Nursing at Syracuse Memorial Hospital. In her role as a clinical instructor, Betty taught and supervised students from ten different nursing schools as they completed the pediatric component of their nursing education.

While in Syracuse Betty met her future husband, Dave, at a CYO dance. As they got to know one another, Betty and Dave realized that they had grown up in the same neighborhood and had attended many of the same Knights of Columbus functions. Betty and Dave were married and raised their children Tom, Mary Beth and David in a lovely Cape Cod style home where Betty still resides today.

Even while raising children Betty kept up with her nursing, working part time at Central Tech teaching in the LPN program. Her career also included 12 years at Van Duyn where she worked in Utilization Review and Admissions.

Betty's Francis House volunteer service began on the Noon to 4 pm shift. She moved to the 10-2 cleaning shift when that was created and continued there until her "retirement" in 2015. When asked about her experience Betty says, "I made many friends at Francis House. I looked forward to coming in and seeing the residents, staff and other volunteers."

Betty feels blessed to have witnessed many special moments at Francis House. She remembers a resident who was a huge SU basketball fan and player Craig Forth visited her on her birthday. Betty recalled how the resident, who had been feeling down, was so surprised and happy. Betty will also never forget when we welcomed an infant as a resident. Betty recalled the special feeling that the presence of that child brought to the house.

We are ever grateful to Betty for her kind and compassionate heart and for all the years of service she has given to our ministry. LIVING THE FINAL CHAPTER SYMPOSIUM 2018

Over 150 attendees including nurses, advanced practice nurses, social workers, physicians, students and the general public gathered at the Genesee Grande Hotel in Syracuse for "Living the Final Chapter: Compassionate Care for Persons at the End of Life" Symposium hosted by Francis House. The symposium was sold out two weeks before. We are grateful to Le Moyne College, Crouse Hospital and SUNY Upstate for assistance in obtaining continuing education units for the professionals in attendance.

The day began with our keynote speaker, B.J. Miller, MD, a nationally known hospice and palliative care physician from California. Dr. Miller spoke to us about "What Really Matters at the End of Life." He encouraged all caregivers to focus on the holistic and individualized care that enhances the quality of the person's day. He asked caregivers to never lose sight of the quality of care that each of us deserve.

The afternoon keynote was presented by Gerontologist Sharon Brangman, MD.

She kept the audience engaged with her discussion of the care of people with end stage Alzheimer's disease. Breakout sessions were presented on end-of-life planning, palliative care, mediation of conflict, comfort care homes, music for healing, sign posts of dying and caregiver resiliency.

The symposium was very successful with evaluations indicating that all learning objectives had been met and giving high marks to all speakers. We are currently in the planning stages for our third symposium to be held in 2020.



The day included time for professionals and caregivers to share experiences and best practices for end-of-life care.
