KATIE HINMAN: TENDING TO THE GARDEN OF LIFE



Those who know her might call Francis House recent resident Katie Hinman the original hometown, smalltown gal. She was raised by her mother in Elbridge, NY, a town just west of Syracuse. Sadly, Katie's father passed away when she was just three months old.

Reflecting on her life, Katie says with a smile, "my life was good." She attended Central City Business Institute

(CCBI) and landed her first job as a secretary at the Farmers and Traders Insurance Company in downtown Syracuse. Katie accepted a new position at Skaneateles Savings Bank and enjoyed a 33-year career there before retiring. It wasn't long before she returned to working at the bank two days a week supporting the branch vice president. "I really enjoyed the bank. Working for kind people who you could respect...that meant a

lot to me."



In Elbridge, Katie and her husband, Bob, built a happy life as they raised their son, David, whom Katie describes as "never any trouble." While tending to her career, family, and her home, Katie also cared for her younger sister who was born with cognitive impairment. She credits her mother as an example of

strength, "I always admired my mother and becoming a mother myself was a huge accomplishment," says Katie.

Katie's family tree continued to grow when son David and his wife, Margie, welcomed granddaughter Jessica into the family. Jessica, now grown, is the proud Mom of Katie's great-grandson, Myles, now six months old.



The hometown gal balanced the challenging times with activities she enjoyed. "I so loved my gardens; vegetable and floral. And, I played in a bridge group with the kindest, dearest friends," says Katie. "My first love was for food... I loved

to cook it and to eat it," Katie says with a laugh. A favorite ritual was eating hot dogs every Saturday; Katie believes hot dogs and so many other foods were made even better if they were cooked over an open fire.

Katie, like most facing an untimely illness or condition, was reluctant to leave the familiarity of her hometown village. Yet once she took a tour of Francis House and met staff and volunteers, she felt she'd 'come home'. "Almost overnight, my mom could see — and feel — the caring and compassion," says her son. "She even asked for her bed to be moved so she could view the gardens."

As she looks back on her life, Katie says making memories with family and friends stands out as most notable. "It doesn't take a trip to Disney or a family cruise... it just takes love and being together."

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE



Anyone who spends time in Francis House becomes very familiar with the concepts of community and mission. These are the very fabric of our being. Yet it was during Sister Colette's recent 70th Jubilee (the anniversary of her vows) that I became most acutely aware of the magnitude of these words and how they impact us every day.

While I watched Sister Colette and her Franciscan sisters recommit themselves to all that it means to be Franciscan, I was unprepared to feel the epiphany I had regarding the intensity of their collective joy. It was palpable. As part of a Franciscan community, Sister Colette came to unequivocally know who she is.

When I joined the Francis House community, I was eager to learn all that Sister could teach me about Franciscan spirituality. I was ready for book recommendations, videos, websites. What I soon discovered at Francis House is that the community teaches by doing. It lives and breathes the St. Francis quote "preach always and if absolutely necessary use words." The values of care, acceptance, respect and dignity embody all who are part of Francis House. Sister Colette exudes these values and leads by example. She tells me that her joy and her spirituality are deepened through her service to others. I have to believe that the four Franciscan pillars are probably embedded in her DNA:

- 1. God is the center; prayer is breath.
- 2. We are born in the image and likeness of God; our lives are God's gift to us; what we do with our lives is our gift to God.
- 3. Gratitude is paramount; "it makes what we have enough."
- 4. Joy is derived through service.

Each day that Colette comes to work (yes, at 88 she is still working!), she comes to give, leading with heart, and no sign of ego. Richard Rohr tells us that the human ego wants two things: It wants to be separate; it wants to be superior. Colette wants neither. Accolades for her years of "showing up" do not interest her.

An authentic community yearns to give and give. And the natural by-product of giving is a more profound sense of community. Sister Colette exemplifies this circle of life.

St. Francis said, "remember that when you leave this earth, you can take with you nothing that you have received ...only what you have given."

Thank you, Sister, for teaching us, without having to use words

Ted McMahon

Ted McMahon has been a part of Francis House from the very beginning. After more than thirty years, he recently retired from his volunteer job as Francis House's "milkman." Ted has



been diligently purchasing, donating, and delivering gallons of milk to Francis House for use in our kitchens. A family affair, and to ensure stock never ran low, Ted's daughter Ellen filled in for him when he was unavailable. Through his behind-thescenes work, Ted has helped us meet our residents' needs without any fanfare. Ted recently retired, not only

from volunteering, but from his insurance career. At the age of 87 he is enjoying his summer home in Canada.

What brought you to Francis House?

I handled the insurance needs for the Third Order of St. Francis, which included the Sisters of St. Francis of the Neumann Communities. Sister Kathleen called me and asked me to help set up insurance for Francis House when she was getting started. I asked her how else I could help. In those days, volunteers were helping provide care to residents 24/7, but I knew that wouldn't be a good fit for me. Sister Kathleen suggested I be the "milkman" and make the milk runs. The rest is history.

What do you enjoy about volunteering at Francis House?

Francis House has grown so much. I remember when it was just four beds and now there are 16. I used to be able to carry three gallons of milk in each hand, and I'd bring them down the longest hallway in the world to the basement. In later years, I had to switch to one gallon per hand, but I could still get in and out pretty quickly. I know there are a lot of people who spend a lot more time there than I do. I'm just glad I could help.

Do you have any fond memories from volunteering?

Recently I was visiting on a Monday, and there was a gentleman playing the piano. There were residents sitting in the great room listening to him play. They invited me to stay and listen with them. It was very nice, and I could tell everyone really enjoyed it.

- staffed by volunteers and/or paid caregivers who are considered "extended family"
- complementary and not duplicative to what already exists in the community
- created by the local community for the local community
- reflective of the spirit of the people and the culture of the local community
- inclusive and open to all people, according to local regulations

She was the best thing that ever happened to me.

relief it was to know that Jill would have a place to rest; she could be at peace in her final days in a loving atmosphere. While Jill did not make it to Francis House, our family found comfort in knowing that a Home like this existed. That feeling has never left us.

My family wants to make sure that other families can have the same



feeling that we have about Francis House. After meeting and working with some of the people there on our tournament, our commitment is even stronger. There is no other way to say it—the people at Francis House are angels. There is no better organization I would want to support.
