“I felt like I walked into God’s House,” said Helen Pepe, as she described the first time she visited Francis House. She wanted to see the place she was considering to call home. As soon as she walked in the door, she looked to her right and saw the chapel. The sense of peace overwhelmed her. The very next day, Helen became a Francis House resident.

Helen was born and raised in northern New York State. She was born in Carthage and her family moved to Watertown when she was a toddler. Helen was the youngest of 7 siblings. Life was simple and family came first. Helen has many fond memories, especially attending Holy Family Elementary School and Immaculate Heart Academy, where she graduated.

It was in high school where Helen met her husband to be, Richard. They began dating during their senior year. Helen says, “Richard was a soft-spoken man with a gentle soul, that is what I loved most about him.” Richard served in the Navy for two years and in April 1952 they were married. The following January they welcomed their first born, Michael. They went on to have two more children, Cheryl and Laurie.

The family moved to Syracuse when Richard was offered a job with General Electric (GE), where he worked for the next 38 years. Helen stayed at home with the children. “They found a friend in Jesus at very early ages. It was how we wanted to raise them, and having my faith helped me throughout my life.”

After their children graduated and moved out, Helen and Richard kept busy. They enjoyed playing cards and socializing at the Mattydale/Hinsdale Senior Club. They also travelled with friends from the club. Ireland and Aruba were Helen’s favorite places to visit.

Richard passed away in 2015. Although it was a tremendous loss, Helen has focused on the blessings of her family, which has grown to include 14 grandchildren, 16 great-grandchildren and a great-great grandchild!

Helen says her family has also grown to include Francis House staff and volunteers as her extended family. Caregiver, Jessica Soulier, shares “Helen has taught me a lot through her stories about her family life. She was married 53 years, so I always listen to her marriage advice. She says the key is to love deeply, be faithful and always compromise.”

Helen can usually be found in her bedroom, watching the Turner Classic Movie station. Caregivers and staff often check-in and Helen will update them on the plot and the famous stars on the screen.

When asked how she would describe her journey at Francis House, Helen says, “I am surrounded by Angels. They are forever known to me as St. Francis Angels.”

Our hearts were saddened to say goodbye to Helen on May 22. We were blessed to have her a member of our family.

It was precisely through those shifting movements of my heart, prayerfully considered over many months, that in January I shared with our Board of Directors my decision to retire from my position as Executive Director effective at the end of this year. While leaving my role is personally difficult, the time is right.

Recently, I stepped along the Walkway of Blessings surrounding our gazebo. I looked over the blessing bricks and remembered. I remembered the names of our residents, recalled their faces and thought about where I was in my life when they came to spend their last days with us.

Some of the names were people I went to visit in their homes or the hospital when I was the new Resident Care Coordinator in 1998. I remembered their stories, families and pets. There was “John,” a wonderful man of Irish descent who always greeted me with a joke and looked for one in return. There was “Richard,” who loved to sit in the sunshine outside of our entry door, serving as an unofficial greeter. He always called my dog “sidewinder” because of the funny way she walked down the hall. So many beautiful people. I remembered the 22 years of names, faces, laughter, tears and hope.

As Francis House grew, so did the walkway. Although we grew in size, we maintained our core values of compassion, unconditional acceptance, respect and dignity. I saw the names of volunteers and supporters and my mind went to the hundreds of people who have given and continue to give selflessly of their time, talent and treasure to ensure the success of Francis House and the values we share. The Walkway of Blessings is well named. Each name is a blessing and those blessings fall on everyone who is a part of the mission and ministry that is Francis House. Over 29 years of compassionate care told in the unending circle of names.

Francis House has never been a job for me. Rather, it has been the ultimate extension of my vocation as a nurse. Even though my recent responsibilities have been administrative, the opportunity to expand and grow at the core of my soul, to be a healer, has been a gift of untold value. I have made lasting friendships and have enjoyed the treasure of knowing goodness in its most pure form.

While I may be stepping away from “official” duties, I will always remain close and connected to this ministry. To be present, as a resident takes the last earthly breath, is indescribable. To be present to and comfort the loved ones left behind, is a gift to the vocation I chose so many years ago. Francis House is and will always be a part of my life.

The work that I have done through the past 22 years has been the most humbling and rewarding of my professional life. To quote Christopher Morley, “There is only one success...to be able to spend your life in your own way.” It has been my way to spend much of my life in service to our dying brothers and sisters. My heart remains full of love for this ministry. I am more grateful than I can say for all the graces and blessings that have been bestowed upon me during my time at Francis House. I wish all of you peace, joy, and more love than you can imagine. I miss you already and will continue to pray every day for your good and the good of Francis House. I ask that you pray for me. May God bless you.

FRANCIS HOUSE IN A TIME OF PANDEMIC

In March, the COVID-19 pandemic turned our lives, indeed our whole world, upside down. Our Spring events, our bi-annual symposium and volunteer dinner, were canceled. Social distancing meant the hugs and holding of hands that were part of our everyday interactions had to stop. We were also faced with the decision of whether or not Francis House could even remain open.

Our ultimate goal was to insure we could safely provide care to our residents and protect our staff while fulfilling our mission to provide a home and extended family. We knew we would be without the support of volunteers. Care staff scheduling had to include a contingency in case of staff member illness. Following CDC guidelines, we had to be even more stringent in our cleaning and disinfecting procedures. We ultimately decided that we would remain open under limited conditions.

By the second week of April, we had consolidated our care into one 8-bedroom home. Administrative staff who could work from home were doing so. We were practicing the recommendations from the CDC including wearing masks and gloves at all times. We temporarily suspended offering bedrooms to new residents. Staff provided care, served meals, and performed the duties usually accomplished by our volunteers.

Throughout these months, we have continued in our mission to care for our residents. It has been possible because of the understanding, prayers and support of our Francis House family. Donations of meals, desserts, supplies and financial support have kept us going. Daily calls and cards have inspired us. Our resident family members have abided by revised visiting hours and temperature taking. And we have been able to slowly bring new residents into our home.

While we miss our hugs and physical connections, we recognize this is the sacrifice we must make to keep all of us safe. Despite our masks, the smiles, kind words and love shine through. Franciscan

writer David B. Conturier, OFM, Cap. Says of this pandemic, “We must strengthen the ties that bind us and appreciate the insights, discoveries, good will and compassion that circle the globe even more profoundly than any virus can.” Those words describe how we have approached this pandemic at Francis House. With God’s grace we will come through this trial with a greater appreciation for what it means to be present to each other.

Kate is grateful for the blessing of her work at Francis House. "From a very early age, I knew my vocation in life would be to work for human dignity and social justice," explains Kate, "and I have been fortunate to be able to have that work in my career."

For the past seven years, Kate served as Executive Director of the Upstate New York Affiliate of Susan G. Komen for the Cure. Prior to joining Komen, she served as Executive Director of both the Rape Crisis Center of Syracuse and Vera House, Inc.

Kate knew the good work of Francis House, but admits her experience as a family member of a resident gave

her a new perspective. "My family didn't know what we were going to do or how we were going to care for our loved one. It was very complicated. Then he was able to come to Francis House. The last weeks of his life became a gift to our family. It was a time where our family could be together and heal; share memories and say things that needed to be said. It was transformative. We spent our days loving him."

Her experience has strengthened her belief in the need for education in end-of-life issues for our community. "It is such a crucial time," explains Kate, "a time that can be overwhelming with choices." She believes that education is a powerful tool to respond to this need. "It is the most powerful gift you can give someone. It is an agent of change and empowers people to better their life."

Kate lives with her husband Dick Mulherin and daughter Emma on Onondaga Hill. Emma, a junior at CBA, is a Francis House Youth Auxiliary Board Member. Kate also has three grown children who live out of town: Courtney and Carey live in Boston; and Taylor lives in New York City. Kate enjoys spending her free time with family and friends, traveling when she can, and reading. She continues to devote her volunteer time promoting health and wellness for our community.
